Medical Boarding on behalf of the Foreign Office Compensation for Victims of Nazi Persecution

M.P.N.I. has agreed to assist the Foreign Office in arranging, where necessary, for claimants to be medically boarded so that the Foreign Office can determine the extent of a claimant's disablement. The Foreign Office will decide entitlement which in broad terms will depend on the extent to which, as a result of imprisonment in a Nazi Concentration Camp, the claimant has suffered permanent disablement.

Generally the Foreign Office will indicate the disabilities which are accepted for compensation purposes and in the normal way boarding will be particularly concerned with those conditions. The claimant should also be given an opportunity, however, to state at the Board the conditions he considers resulted from his imprisonment and the Board's report should cover all conditions claimed.

If it is not quite clear which conditions the Foreign Office has accepted the claimant should be asked, at the board, for details of the disabilities which he considers have resulted from imprisonment and the board report should deal particularly with these.

The Foreign Office realises that without background information of treatment, etc., it will be difficult for boarding doctors to offer reliable advice about the extent of a claimant's disablement. Nevertheless, we hope that the board reports will give them a broad indication of the claimant's health and the extent to which he is disabled as a result of having been in a Concentration Camp. If there is some doubt as to the exact assessment it will be sufficient for Foreign Office purposes for the degree of disablement from the condition(s) accepted, or likely to be accepted, as due to the imprisonment, to be given on one of the following categories:-

- (1) less than 20%
- (2) 20% to 50%
- (3) 51% to 80%
- (4) more than 80%

As stated above the Foreign Office will indicate the conditions which are, or which will probably be, accepted as resulting from imprisonment. There may be other conditions however discovered by the Board or mentioned to the Board by the claimant or detailed in any medical documents produced to the Board. The Foreign Office would like to have an assessment of all the conditions claimed or likely to have resulted from imprisonment. If appropriate a composite assessment should be given.

If necessary, an examination by a Consultant or an X-ray examination may be arranged. Nevertheless, it is hoped that this will not normally be necessary. If exceptionally, it is found impossible for boarding to be carried out without some exceptionally, it is found impossible for boarding to be carried out without some background information or details of previous treatment, the documents should be returned to Central Office, Norcross (N.3A(M)) with an indication of the difficulty.

If the claimant produces medical documents which are clearly relevant to the claim and he is agreeable for them to be sent to the Foreign Office, they should be securely fastened to the boarding documents.

On the advice of Mrs. Margaret Thatcher from the Ministry Of Pension and National Insurance (Ref. No. M. C. 48546) I am writing to claim for compansation for my sufferings.

During the war when I lived in Guernsey and worked in the underground movement, after three and a half years they arrested me, to tured, condemned to death and through Ten prisons I was 18 months in Ravens-

bruck concentration camp. The result is that I am deaf on my left ear, I suffer from insommia and giddiness and since the war I hardly could earn for

my living. When I came back from Ravensbruck my home was robed by the Guernsey people -my jewelry by the Germans), they did not leave a blanket for me. This time Col.R.S.Bacon and Lt.Col.Arnold whose office was in Hotel Victoria room 312, tried to get some compensation from the Guernsay State but they refused to give me anything on the ground that all the Channel Isls. people lost which is certainly true but as far as I know only one woman was in Ravensbruck from Jersey who unfortunately was put in gas. Her name was Mrs. Luise Gould and died 13 Febr. 1945.

Because I was born in Hungary and my husband Mr. Barry in the Irish Free State, I am not aligible for any compensation under the War

Pension instruments.

six weeks in the Guernsey prison I was taken to the Jersey prison and about ten other prisons in France and Germany. I know Paris, Romanwille in solitary, arrived in dark and left in dark. That is why I do not know the names.

I was taken to Ravensbruck concentration camp at 1st of May,1944. In prisons I never had number, but in Ravensbruck I had 37, or 39.000, I am sorry forgot the correct number. But sure somebody from my transport will claim who has the same number. In Guernsey I was working for the Germans, was "friendly" with them and, so I had opportunity to have knowledge of many things which I passed to Mr. Barry who became later my husband for the only rason, to carry on our underground work. I never knew to whom did he passed the news. I had my radio and, was able to spread the news I listened and made every sabotage I could. For that two pro British German soldiers helped me but never betray me.

In 27 th of April 1945 I was lierated and, taking to Sweden.
I was tertured in Rennes, not so much in Guernsey and, the result
is a permanent deafness, glddiness, heada-ache and a permanent diarrhea

which the doctors try to cure still.

When I came back to Guernsey, my home was robed by a Guernsey girl whom I reported to the police. And though I gave the full address of the girl they never did anything and so I lost all my silvers, some jewels, china, clothing, bedings etc. Col. R.S. Bacon and Lt. Col. Arnold tried to help me, they wrote to the Guernsey Governour but the answer was that evrybody lost I am not exception. So I never got a penny not only for my personal loss but even for the hearingaid which cost a lot to my family but without that I can not live.



I am writing to you about your application for compensation as a British victim of Nazi persecution.

I am sorry to have to tell you that the information you have given so far is not sufficient for us to reach a favourable decision on your application. The difficulty is one of nationality. You stated that you married Mr. Barry in 1942 and at that time he was a citizen of Eire. Unless, therefore, Mr. Barry had applied at that time for British citizenship, you would not have been a United Kingdom national at the time of your persecution. It is therefore important to establish what your nationality was immediately before 1 October, 1953, and for this purpose we should need to see your Certificate of Marriage to Mr. Chapman and if this occurred after 1948 we should also need to know whether you applied yourself for registration as a United Kingdom citizen before 1 October, 1953.


You have sent us a letter dated 14 November, 1962 from the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, informing you that your application to them for compensation could not be reviewed. Se should also like to see the original letter from the Commissioner, in which your claim was first rejected.


