SHOT IN MILITARY ZONE

WHILE ATTEMPTING FLIGHT AFTER ARREST

A local man, Henry Peter Turpin (29), born at St. Ouen, and who had resided at La Mielie, Five Mile Road, was shot dead on Saturday night when attempting flight after arrest by a patrol of the Germany Army of Occupation.

It is stated that Turpin, who had been arrested in the military zone by a German guard some time ago, and eventually liberated, was again observed on Saturday evening walking in the military zone during prohibited hours. He was arrested, but whilst being taken along broke loose from the guard and took to flight. He was called upon three times to stop, but ignored the command. The guard thereupon opened fire, and Turpin was shot dead.

We hope that this tragic occurrence will act as a warning to all persons not to enter the military zone during prohibited hours—8 p.m. to 7.30 a.m.

MR. RYAN'S XI v. VICTORIA COLLEGE

Victoria College defeated Mr. Ryan's XI by a one-goal margin after a keenly-contested game at the F.B. Fields on Saturday last.

The game opened evenly, but it was not long before the College attack, supported by steady halves, moved the ball into their opponents' circle. These attacks were checked by the XI's defence, of whom Knight figured splendidly. Mr. Ryan's XI were very reluctant to force home a determined attack and the College defence were able to withstand their attempts with little difficulty. At the other end, the College forwards were unable to find the net, this being due to the hindering tactics of the XI defence. However, the College attackers still refused to cede any determination to reach goal.

Both sides attacked in turn, the XI's attacks being checked at the twenty-five line whilst the College attackers narrowly missed scoring on several occasions. Half-time was reached with no goals having been scored.

The second half began at a renewed pace, both sides being determined to gain a telling lead. The College gained this lead, which they held to the end. The goal came from an attack which finished with Mourant, E., scoring with an unexpected shot from a difficult angle.
